USDA Proposed National Leafy Green Marketing Agreement

The USDA is moving forward with rulemaking for the National Leafy Green Marketing Agreement (NLGMA). The agreement was proposed in 2009 by produce industry representatives. USDA held 7 hearings across the country during 2009 and received over 5000 pages of testimony. They have made changes to the proposal after the first comment period among those are:

1. Leafy greens are arugula, cabbage, chard, cilantro, endive, escarole, kale, lettuce, parsley radicchio, spinach and "Spring Mix (baby lettuces, mustards, chards spinach and chicories). Others could be added.
2. The number of administrative zone were increased to 8 state groupings based on similar climates, production environments, crops , agricultural practices, etc. New Jersey is in zone 8 with Pennsylvania, New York, New Hampshire, Maine, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island.
3. The administrative board would be made up of 26 members of which 10 would be growers including two small growers, 12 handlers (buyers), 1 retail person, 1 public member, 1 foodservice person and 1 importer; all appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture.
4. A Technical Review Committee would assist the board in developing standards for third party audits. The committee will be made up of growers, handlers, food safety experts, FDA, NRCS, etc.
5. All standards that are developed would go out for public comment before taking affect.
6. Any regulations developed by FDA for the Food Safety Modernization act would apply.
7. This is a voluntary handler agreement, however if a handler signs up then he must buy his leafy greens from a grower who is third party audited.
8. An assessment per carton will not exceed \$0.05 per 24-pound carton of leafy green vegetables to cover administrative costs and verification audits for first handlers and their producers, research and education.
9. If a handler signs up and imports leafy greens that product is also covered under the agreement.
10. If you are a grower (no matter what size) that sells to a handler that is a signatory to the Agreement then you would need to follow the agreement.

The full proposal text was published in the Federal Register on April 29. Go to www.ams.usda.gov for a copy. There is a 90 day comment period where anyone can comment anonymously if desired. All comments must be received by July 28, 2011. Read the document and make your feelings known. This will be critical for the leafy green industry in New Jersey.

FDA Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Update

NJDA, Vegetable Growers Merge Convention

Two of New Jersey agriculture's most influential annual gatherings are joining forces for the first time in January 2012 to create a formidable showcase of the Garden State's agrarian advances.

The New Jersey Department of Agriculture (NJDA) and the Vegetable Growers Association of New Jersey (VGANJ) jointly announced the merging of their respective conventions into one massive convention/trade show. While both groups will conduct separate programs, the combined convention will appeal to New Jersey's diverse agricultural industry by promoting greater participation and interaction among a wider cross-section of industry members from all sectors.

The convention/trade show is slated for the week of January 16, 2012 at the Trump Taj Mahal in Atlantic City.

Held since 1914, the NJDA conducts a legally mandated annual convention of the state's entire agricultural industry. As specified under New Jersey statutes, each year delegates representing all sectors of the industry must gather to elect two members to the New Jersey State Board of Agriculture, elect farmer-members to the Fish and Game Council, and set agricultural policy for the New Jersey Department of Agriculture through a series of formal resolutions voted on by the delegates.

Founded in 1955, the Vegetable Growers Association of New Jersey's mission is to disseminate knowledge of the growing and marketing of vegetables through cooperation with the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station and Rutgers Cooperative Research and Extension, the New Jersey and U.S. Departments of Agriculture, and all other existing organizations and committees working for or interested in the vegetable industry of the Garden State.

Each year, the VGANJ hosts a convention/trade show where farmers attend educational sessions, earn continuing education credits, and learn about the latest advances in fruit and vegetable research. The New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station and Rutgers Cooperative Extension plan and coordinate these sessions.

New Jersey Secretary of Agriculture Douglas H. Fisher said the State Board determined that a VGANJ proposal to merge the conventions would benefit all sectors of New Jersey agriculture by bringing the policy aspects of the State Convention together with the broader educational elements of the VGANJ gathering.

"Our convention is all about hearing the opinions and views of members of New Jersey's agricultural community to help us best utilize the Department's resources to serve this very important industry," Secretary Fisher said. "We welcome the opportunity to widen the scope of attendees and expand our ability to hold listening sessions. Hopefully, everyone will find the additional seminars and a trade show beneficial in helping them improve their individual operations."

VGANJ President Joe Marino added that combining the conventions also will help the state's farmers stay abreast of recent developments even in tougher economic times.

"The recent economic climate has made it tough for farm families to expend the money to attend numerous conventions and trade shows typically held during the off-season," Marino said. "We hope that by combining two events into one, convention participants will experience a greater value in attending. If this proves successful, we hope that other New Jersey agricultural entities will want to join us, and make this convention the one 'must-attend' event of the year."

NOTICE TO HISPANIC AND/OR WOMEN FARMERS OR RANCHERS

COMPENSATION FOR CLAIMS OF DISCRIMINATION

If you believe that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) improperly denied farm loan benefits to you between 1981 and 2000 because you are Hispanic, or because you are female, you may be eligible to apply for compensation. This means you may be eligible if:

- 1.** you sought a farm loan or farm-loan servicing during that period; and
- 2.** the loan was denied, provided late, approved for a lesser amount than requested, or approved with restrictive conditions, or USDA failed to provide an appropriate loan service; and
- 3.** you believe these actions were based on your being Hispanic, or your being female.

In 2011, a claims administrator will begin mailing claims packages to those who have requested one through the Call Center or website. The claims package will have detailed information about the eligibility and claims process.

For guidance, you may contact a lawyer or other legal services provider in your community.

If you are currently represented by counsel regarding allegations of discrimination or in a lawsuit claiming discrimination, you should contact your counsel regarding this claims process.

EPA - Spill Control Rules

This Week in Farm Bureau Vol. XLVIII, No. 24

Farmers are advised to take heed of an on-coming deadline for compliance with EPA's oil spill control prevention program. This is the rule that attracted notoriety for briefly being associated with milk spills on dairy farms and dairy processing facilities. The underlying rule adopted in 1974 governing above-ground storage of petroleum products, however, remains in place and is now subject to enforcement (facilities in place pre 2002; Nov. '11 deadline for later facilities). Businesses including farms subject to the rule that store 1,320 gallons of oil or fuel in above-ground containers (or 42,000 gal.+ in buried containers) must have a control plan if an accidental release could reasonably be expected to discharge into waters of the United States. Amendments to the rule adopted in January 2010 were made to simplify compliance for farmers subject to the rule (example: farmers can self-certify their spill control plan).
