Valuing the Importance of Agriculture

If you already sent in your census form, thank you! If you have not yet, please do so. It is important to accurately account for the importance of New Jersey and Cumberland County agriculture.

Anyone who did not get a census form, needs another form or has any questions, please call 717-787-3904.

****New this year - you can complete the survey online. Growers who have already completed the survey via the online format have found a reduction in time.****

Please note that individual responses to the Census of Agriculture are required to be kept confidential by law, and only aggregate data are used for reporting purposes. The reports produced are important in showing the economic impact and significance of the agriculture industry to New Jersey. The USDA Census of Agriculture is one of the most comprehensive means of accounting for your economic impacts.

Soil Test Changes

The cost of a soil test kit remains at \$20; however starting with the 2018 season, there will be a \$7.00 charge added to the cost of soil test kits due to the increase in postage. With this added charge, the total for a soil test is \$27.00.

Anyone purchasing a soil test kit will have two options:

- Purchase the kit (\$20) and take it to the post office - or - -
- Leave at the Extension Center and pay a \$7.00 s/h cost

We regret having to add this charge to the cost, however the cost for mailing the kits has increased greatly. If you have any questions, please contact Pam Burton, 856-451-2800 x4.

Inflation Adjustments for the FSMA Produce Rule

Questions continue to be asked about whether a grower falls under the Food Safety Modernization Act Produce Rule. Generally, any operation that have sales over \$500,000 falls under the rule. However, FDA has built in an inflation value with a baseline of 2011 for the qualified exemption and for farms that do not fall under the rule. These figures will be adjusted yearly based on inflation.

Qualified Exemption: A farm is eligible for a qualified exemption if the average annual monetary value of all food sold during the 3-year period preceding the applicable calendar year was less than \$500,000, adjusted for inflation, and sales to qualified end-users during such period exceeded the average annual monetary value of the food sold by such farm to all other buyers.

Annual Submittal of Pesticide Applicator Storage Inventory

In New Jersey, all licensed pesticide applicators who store pesticides are required to maintain a list of the pesticides stored or likely to be stored during the license year.

- All licensed pesticide applicators who store pesticides are required by law to send a copy of their storage inventory with an explanatory cover letter to the local fire company along with a description and/or diagram of the actual location of each storage area.
- Submittal to the fire department is required annually by May 1st each year. Applicators must keep the cover letter on file for a minimum of three years and should have it available for NJDEP upon request.

Attached to this newsletter is a sample of the letter to send to the fire company, sample pesticide storage inventory list and sample pesticide application record.

- 3. The **booklet must be removed** (you do not have to remove the paper labels glued to the container or the plastic sleeves);
- 4. Foil seal must be removed;
- 5. Only non-refillable pesticide containers will be accepted you should **drill a ¼-inch hole in the container** or with a **utility knife make a slit in the of the container so the container will not hold liquids**;
- 6. Only pesticide containers embossed with HDPE or the recycling #2 will be accepted;
- 7. Pesticide containers up to 55-gallons in capacity will be accepted. 5-gallon pales must be cut in half; 30-gallon containers into at least 4 pieces; and 55-gallon containers into at least 6 pieces. This can be accomplished using a sawzall, chainsaw, circular saw, or reciprocating saw. It is not necessary to cut up containers less than 5-gallons; and

Non-Waxy Cardboard Collection

For Your Convenience Plastics Drop Off Hours:

Monday – Friday 6:00 am - 5:00 pm Saturday – 7am - 3:45pm

Nursery Greenhouse Film

- 1) Film must be rolled into manageable bundles.
- 2) Please shake the plastics and remove all the soil, plant material, twine, etc.
- 3) If bundles are tied they must be tied with greenhouse or nursery film.
- 4) Material must be free from debris, dirt and moisture and if possible stored out of the sun and rain. If they need to be stored outside please cover with plastic.
- 5) Comingled Loads will be accepted but must be segregated.
- 6) Trucking Services available, please contact us.

Pesticide Containers

Allied Recycling will accept non-refillable, high-density polyethylene #2 (HDPE) containers that have been triple rinsed. You must make sure containers are dry inside after they are rinsed out and either cut a 6-inch slit in the bottom or drill a quarter-inch hold in the bottom of the container to insure it will not hold liquids. Lids must be removed. Foil seal also must be removed. Containers that are 30 gallon size must be cut up into 4 pieces using a sawzall, chainsaw, circular saw, etc. 55 gallon containers must be cut up into 8 pieces accordingly. Nonwaxy cardboard also will be accepted during this collection program, since most of these products are sold in cardboard boxes. Collection of cardboard will take place any business day.

Allied Recycling will not accept containers if they have held any type of petroleum oil product or antifreeze. Pesticide containers with any liquid or dried residue will not be accepted. No minibulk, saddle tanks or nurse tanks will be accepted, as they may be made of fiberglass. Pesticide applicators who wish to receive a core credit for recycling their pesticide container; forms will be available from Allied Recycling.

Agricultural Plastics, Irrigation Pipe And Drip Tape

1) Material must be rolled and tied into manageable bundles.

- 2) Please shake the plastics and remove all the soil, plant material, twine, etc.
- 3) Bundles must be tied with drip tape.
- 4) Material must be free from debris, dirt and moisture and if possible stored out of the sun and rain. If they need to be stored outside please cover with plastic.
- 5) We will accept comingled loads, drip tape to be tied and segregated from other material.
- 6) Trucking Services available, please contact

Plastic Nursery Pots, Trays, Flats

- 1) Plastic Pot, trays, flats are
- 2) Please shake the pots and remove all the soil, plant material, twine, etc.
- 3) Plastics containers must be nested. Please separate individual plastics by type, palletized and shrink wrap. #5 polypropylene PP, #2 HDPE, #6 Polystyrene PS. Plastics need to be separated by type but do not need to be separated by color.
- 4) Material must be free from debris, dirt and moisture and if possible stored out of the sun and rain. If they need to be stored outside please cover with plastic.
- 5) We will accept comingled loads provided material is segregated and wrapped.
- 6) Trucking Services available, please contact.

Non Waxy Cardboard – will accept cardboard form commercial farmers during business hours.

Other Rigid Plastics – will accept other rigid plastics at our facility for recycling. Allied Recycling will pay farmers for metals recycled at our facility.

HELP SPREAD THE WORD – HELP US RECRUIT NEW PARTICIPANTS FOR THIS FREE PROGRAM so we can exceed last year's collection efforts.

If you bring your triple rinsed plastic pesticide containers to Cream Ridge, it would be great if you had the containers tied together with a string/twine. Don't forget to take the lids off the containers and remove the booklet. You don't have to scrape off the labels. This program is offered to agricultural, professional and commercial pesticide applicators who hold a NJDEP pesticide license. State, county and municipal government agencies may also participate. A

representative from the New Jersey Department of Agriculture will be on-site to inspect the containers and issue one core credit to pesticide license holders who follow all of the required processing steps. To receive credit, participants must bring their pesticide license to the collection site and must follow all of the processing steps. Core credits will not be issued to participants who fail to follow all of the pesticide container processing steps.

To receive your core credit for recycling, please see staff in the office.
